Families Learning Conference

Parent Engagement Idea

Springtime brings a variety of colors in nature to life. These two activities will get you and your child outside to enjoy the beauty that is spring while also engaging your child's developing math and science skills in observing, categorizing, counting, comparing, and ordering.

Counting Petals:

- Go on a walk with your child and collect different flowers from your neighborhood. As you are collecting, talk with your child about the variety of colors, shapes, and sizes of the petals on the flowers you find.
- Ask your child: How many petals? Pluck each petal off as your child counts it to be sure the same petal is not counted twice.
- Keep the conversation going by asking: Do any of these flowers have the same number of petals? Which flower has the greatest (or least) number of petals? The biggest (or smallest)?

Nature Scavenger Hunt:

- You will need a white paper bag (or a white piece of paper and a small bag) and crayons or markers. Choose the colors you want your child to hunt for and use your crayons or markers to scribble squares onto the front of each bag (or on the white paper.)
- Give your child the bag and let them have fun finding objects in nature that match the same colors on the bag. When they find an item that matches one of the colors, place it in the bag. Have fun listening to your child show and tell you about all of the items they have found!
