The Rough Rock Community School FACE Team shared their fourth week of school in Denver, Colorado, where they attended the Parents as Teachers (PAT) Conference. The picture was captured not long after their first team presentation/workshop, Hozho: Balancing Curriculum, Culture, and Navajo Lifestyle. The team shared: "Incorporating the meaning of the four sacred colors—black, yellow, blue, and white—we chose to utilize those colors to stand in for infants, toddlers, children aged three to five, and parental involvement."

Delores Bitsilly, Principal at Tohaali Community School, shared a resource from Americans for Native Americans that might be of use to your FACE site!

Americans for Native Americans (ANA) is a small non-profit organization which works specifically with the Hopi, Navajo, and Zuni Nations. One of ANA's main focuses is children. We work with BIE schools and their FACE programs. ANA provides baby layettes—complete with diaper bag, baby supplies, and clothing for new mothers and their infants, and can pay for testing fees for parents with no financial resources who have studied toward their GED tests. ANA can also provide other resources: clothing, books, and snacks as needed. Parent Engagement Ideas

Writing on a Vertical Surface

Like an artist working in their studio at an art easel, writing and drawing on a vertical surface is fun and good for your child's development! It can help a child improve their writing skills and strengthen muscles they need to write. Writing on a wall gives children a larger surface area to create, which helps children who need to move their body more. Families can give children sidewalk chalk or water and a paintbrush and allow them to write on a vertical surface outdoors such as a wall or fence.

Writing on a vertical surface does not just have to be on a wall or using a writing tool. Families can have their child use a damp cloth on windows or doors. If you use something that is harder to clean up, like paint or crayons, protect your homes by putting up a piece of cardboard or an old bed sheet.



Site Spotlight

The T'iis Ts'ozí Bi'Olta' FACE Team successfully completed requirements for Adult and Pediatric First Aid/CPR/AED in August 2022 to be certified as required by the National Association for the Education of Young Children (NAEYC.) They shared:

"We are awaiting notification of our recertification of re-accreditation. This required training was completed in-person. All members of our FACE team were certified. It was interactive, fun, and very informative for all."



Site Spotlight

The T'iis Ts'ozí Bi'Olta' FACE Team also shared an activity that was completed in August to strengthen PACT Time in the home by using the outdoor environment within the community. The activity was taking a nature walk around the school and collecting interesting materials and plants along the way. Parents were encouraged to talk to their children to increase their language and vocabulary. Parents were also encouraged to use the native language in identifying plants and critters.



Site Spotlight

Pueblo Pintado Community School and Oneida Nation Elementary School shared one daily component within The Creative Curriculum that has seen great success: Question of the Day boards. The Question of the Day prompts children to use their language skills as they express their thoughts about the question and listen to their peers' thoughts. Having a Question of the Day board posted outside your classroom in the morning allows parenting adults to be involved in helping their child answer the question. This also helps parenting adults have conversations with the child after school about what their child learned that day!
